MUSEUM OF CONTEMPORARY SCIENCE | ROEBLING MACHINE SHOP

Trenton’s Roebing Wireworks, founded in 1848 by engineering genius John A. Roebing, produced the wire rope for the nation’s most famous suspension bridges. The Roebing Complex, located on about 45 acres near downtown Trenton, was one of the main reasons why New Jersey’s capital city became an industrial powerhouse. Built in phases starting in 1890, the Roebing Machine Shop is one of the most beautiful and impressive industrial structures in New Jersey and now houses the Museum of Contemporary Science (MoCS). The building is undergoing renovations and has received two grants from the New Jersey Historic Trust.
